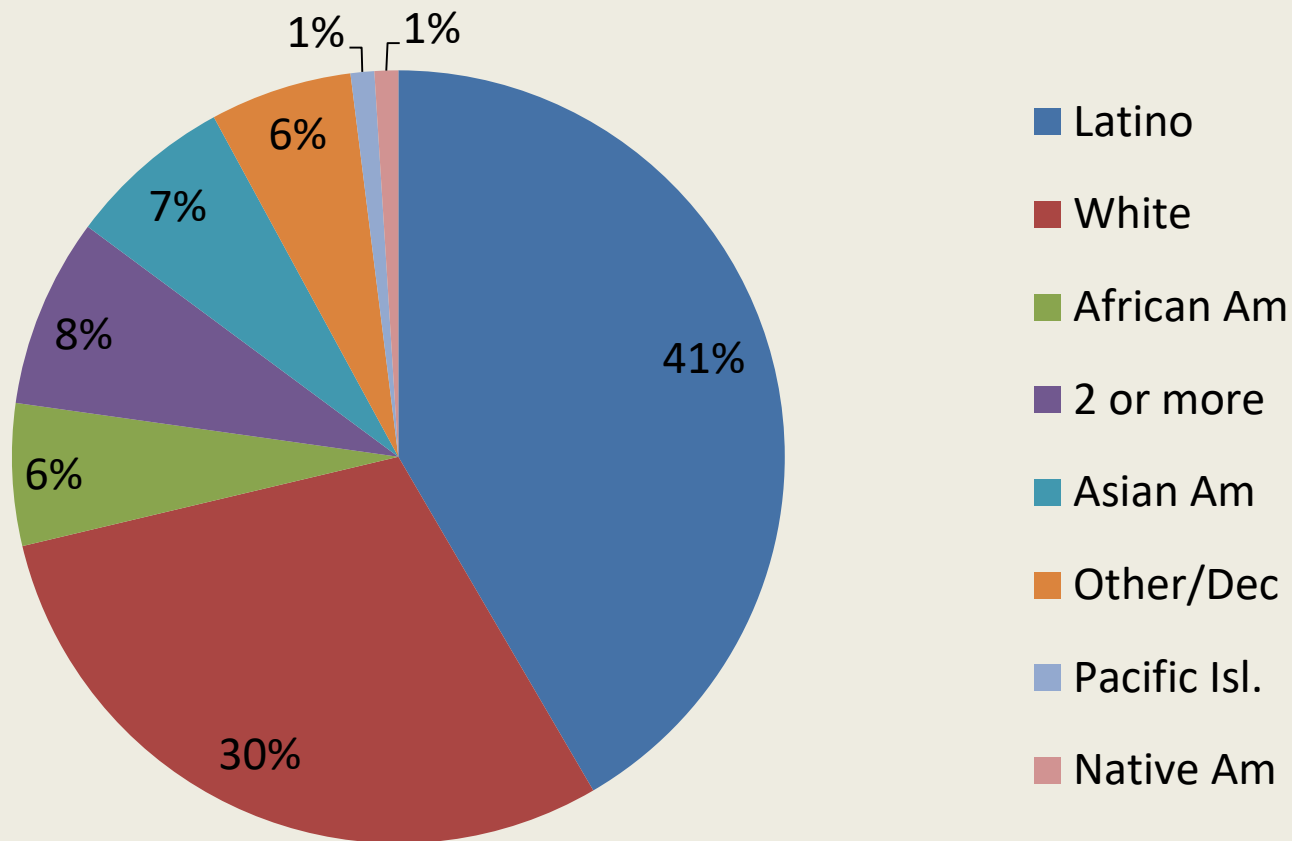


Where our students come from

- 40 % from Tri-County service area (Monterey, Santa Cruz, San Benito)
- 55 % from the rest of California
 - 16 % Northern California
 - 18 % Central California
 - 21 % Southern California
- 2 % Out-of-state
- 3 % International



Serving a diverse student body



57% of our undergraduates are first-generation college students.

Monterey Bay College Pathways Partnership (MBCPP)

- Memorandum of understanding between CSUMB, Hartnell, Cabrillo and MPC.
- Expands the number of 2-plus-2 four-year degrees between CSUMB and community college partners.
- MBCPP will shorten time-to-degree for local transfer students, reduce degree costs, and advance CSUMB's Graduation Initiative goals.

 - ACE = Admission through Co-Enrollment
 - Hospitality (2019) -Nursing (ADN/BSN)

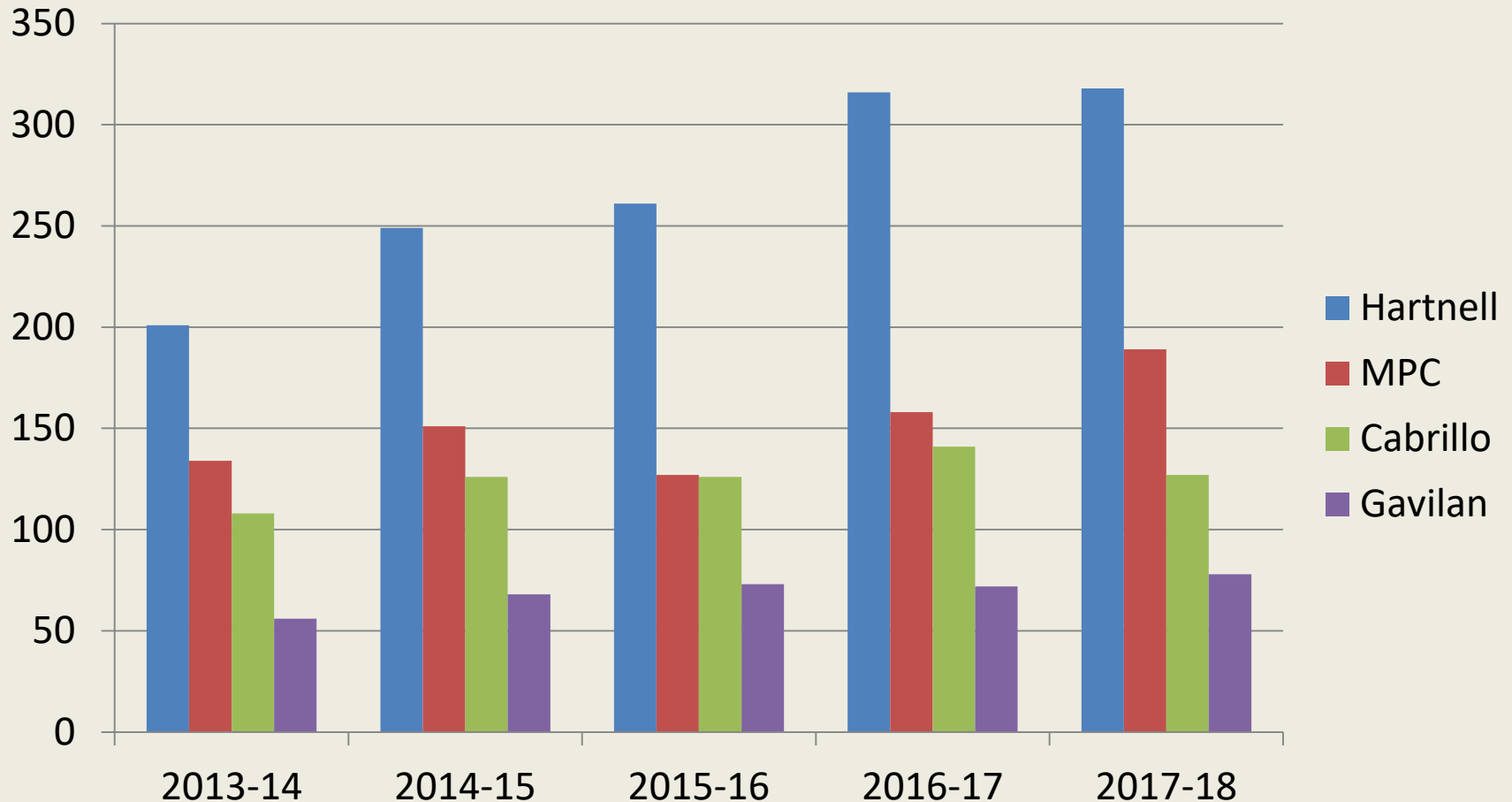


Monterey Bay College Pathways Partnership

- Guided Pathways: a proven model to accelerate degree completion within individual institutions.
- The MBCPP uses articulation agreements, faculty cooperation, and academic advising to extend the Pathways model to CC/CSU transfer students.
- Planned MBCPP-wide programs include Marine Science, Computer Science, and Business.



Community college transfers

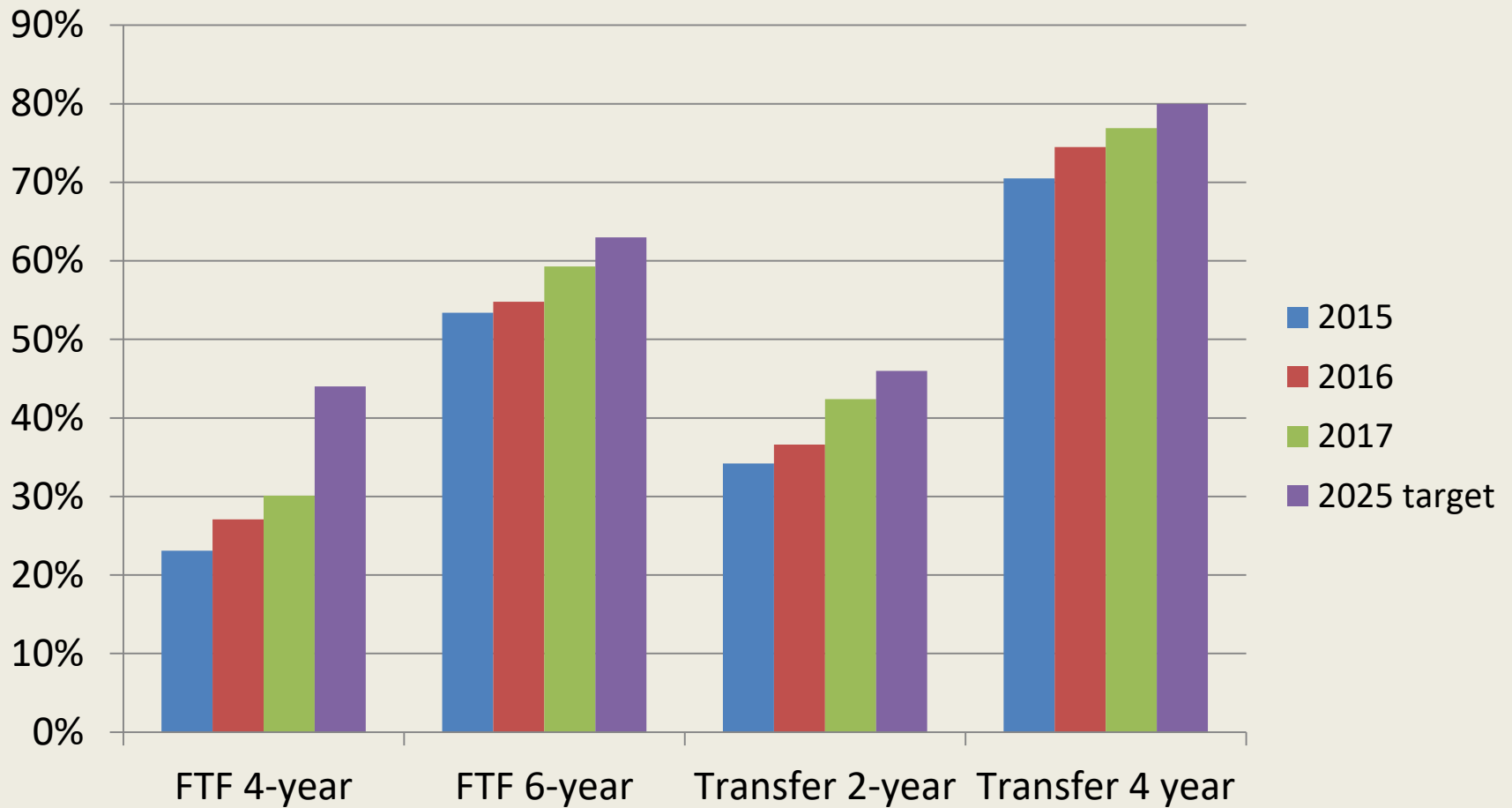


Graduation Initiative 2025

- CSU-wide effort
- Sets targets for each campus to:
 - raise graduation rates, close achievement gaps
 - encourage more timely graduation
 - save students money
 - increase capacity of CSU to address projected shortage of college graduates
- CSUMB received \$2.88 million in targeted funding to support this initiative in 18-19 state budget



CSUMB Progress on Graduation Rates



2018 Commencement

- A record 2,321 candidates for graduation (last year 2,083)
- 2,081 Bachelor's Degrees, 240 Master's Degrees
- 245 came through our Early Outreach and Support Programs
- Graduates from 28 states, 29 countries
- Most popular majors - Business Administration, Psychology, Kinesiology



Building for growth



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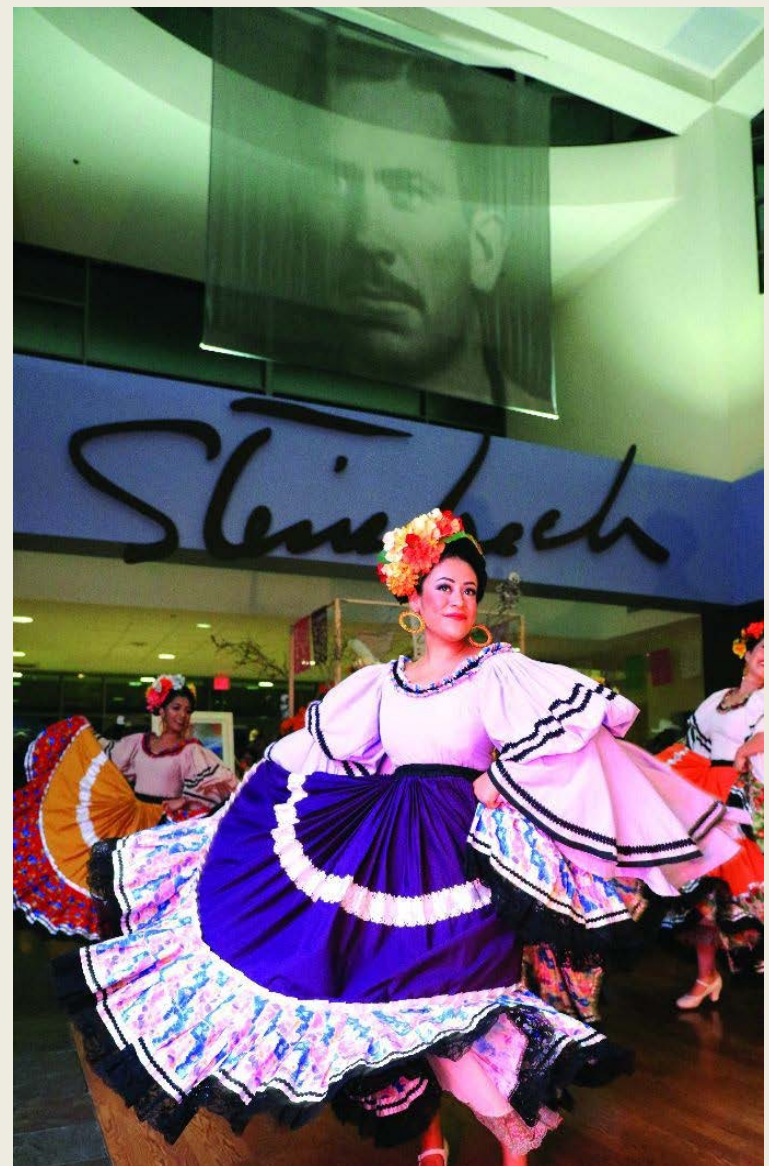
Master of Science Physician Assistant program

- Program will welcome its first cohort of students in January 2019
- Classwork at CSUMB @ North Salinas, our first North Salinas program
- Will address critical shortage of primary care practitioners in our region
- Working closely with local health care providers to offer internship opportunities to MSPA students
- First program of its kind at a CSU campus



Salinas Center for Arts and Culture

- Community-focused cultural hub located at CSUMB@Salinas City Center
- A place where people and programs can come together
- Building partnerships with local arts groups
- Sponsors First Friday events that highlight wide range of arts programs from around the community
- Center to begin offering limited academic advising and student support services in 2019

Progress on goals

- Adopted Big Goal - By 2025, raise the share of youth who complete a post-high school credential to 60 percent, from current 25 percent
- Compiling data on progress measures in seven areas:
 1. Early Child Care
 2. Kindergarten Readiness
 3. Language and Literacy
 4. Critical Thinking
 5. Youth Connectedness
 6. College/Training Ready
 7. Career Pathway
- Many measures showing progress, particularly in several lower-income districts
